

## 2018 NEW YEAR BASH GAMES

I am a little late presenting games from the New Year Bash that was held January 6 in Olathe, KS. One can make a case for publishing a few games to the web early and then posting other games later. I thought about that as I had a couple of games I could have posted sooner but I didn't follow up. I posted results, pictures, and cross tables to the web and then worked on games very slowly. It is hard work reading all those score sheets.

There were **three sections** in the **New Year Bash**. This is like we have now for the Kansas Open. This is new for the New Year Bash this year. I have mostly games from **Open section** to post. There are several reasons for that. First, I had more games from the Open section that I could follow. Also, I was able to correspond with a couple of Open players via e-mail to get clarification on moves. I have only one game from the **Reserve section** to present. The main reason: I only had five total score sheets turned in from Reserve section with 13 players playing 4 rounds. I probably had as many score sheets turned in for the **Amateur section** as the Open section (though the Amateur section had almost twice as many players). In the Amateur section I was not able to follow the moves in most games (some missing important moves for instance) and many were illegible often at very important junctures in the games. Then, there were blunders in many Amateur section games that I could follow.

Thus, here is my list. Also, this year I mainly used Stockfish program to analyze games. (Stockfish is the new world computer champion)

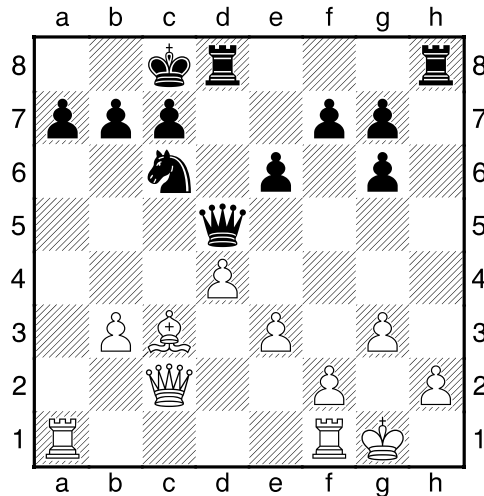


It is uncertain what happened here. Maybe Sameeth offered a draw and Kaustabh accepted it. 26.Be5? should lose. Maybe after Sameeth made the move he realized he made a mistake and that is why he offered the draw. Or, maybe he did not know it was a mistake. It is uncertain. Winning for black is 26...f6 followed by 27...Re8. After that the white queen is unable to protect the rook on e1 as there is no escape square that will also protect rook on e1. After 26...f6, the light square bishop on g6 is now protecting the black rook after it moves to e8. 27.Bg3 does not work because of 27...Re8 attacking queen which cannot protect rook on e1 if the queen moves. White's best response to 26...f6 is simply to play 27.Bxf6 and black is a whole piece for a pawn up. There could follow 27...Bxf6 28.Ne4 (pawn on d5 is pinned after 26...f6) Be7 and 29.Qf3 --+(-3.00)] ½-½
